Studying population is an important element human geography. In this unit we will look at a variety of topics and issues relating to the population of the world, Canada and our own community.


Demography: the study of human populations, in particular, how they change over a period of time.

World: 7,300,000,000 – approx. (United Nations – July 2015). On Oct. 12, 1999, the world's population reached 6 billion for the first time. We added 1 billion people in only 11 years!
